Bill is the author of several local history books, including one called "Plainsboro Images of America" which led to Bill's particular interest in Elsie the Cow. Bill spent many hours with local inhabitants who recall the various Elsies who lived in Plainsboro, including a woman who traveled across the country with Elsie.
