For over 100 years the primary mission of the Women's College Club of Princeton (WCCP) has been to award scholarships to outstanding young women with financial need graduating from Princeton High School, Princeton Day School, The Hun School, Stuart Country Day School of the Sacred Heart and beginning this year, the Lewis School.

To date, these awards have totaled over \$700,000. They are made possible as a result of endowments, fundraisers and donations, including those made in honor or memory of present or former members of the Club, such as the annual Florence Hillier Award made possible by her son Bob Hillier.

Meetings of the WCCP are held on the third Monday of the month at the Stockton Education Center on the grounds of the Morven Museum. They feature outstanding speakers and programs of multiple interests including former U.S. presidents, art history with docents from the Princeton Art Museum, gardening and climate change, and history of African Americans in Princeton.

In addition to its monthly gatherings, the Club offers a variety of activities for members to take advantage of in smaller groups. Reading (book club), walking or hiking, lunching out at local restaurants, taking trips to museums or other points of interest, and playing cards are several examples of what the Club offers.

The lifelong friendships that are formed as a result of Club membership and participation in these and many other activities cannot be overstated. This very level of energy and dedication has contributed to the success of this club for over a hundred years.

While a student at Bennett College for Women, she participated in the 1961 sit-Ins in Greensboro, North Carolina. She has pursued a rich career as an educator, guidance counselor, spiritual leader, and historian.

Governor Christie Whitman recognized her excellence in establishing an outstanding

organization for young women in Princeton High School. In 2007 Shirley argued before the Princeton Borough Council to name the plaza next to the Library after Mr. Albert Edward Hines, an ordinary man who did extraordinary deeds for most of his 104 years in Princeton.

Shirley is passionate about honoring the past, enriching the present, and creating organizations that will endure into the future. We look forward to her sharing her passions with us.

NEW MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

This month we are highlighting new member Christine (Chris) Greges.

Chris is a Jersey girl, born and bred in Colonia (part of Woodbridge Township) and attended Douglass College (BA) and Rutgers University (MLS) in the 1970s. While in college, she majored in Latin-American Studies but spent a lot of time working in the technical end of the theater department - box office, costumes, scenic production and stage and house managing. Her biggest challenge was when a production of "The Soft Touch" by Rutgers alum Neil Cuthbert won the American College Theatre Festival in 1974 and the show was transported to the Eisenhower Theater at the Kennedy Center. As stage manager, Chris not only had to contend with getting the cast and crew acclimated to the much larger stage and its environs, but also had to contend with some crusty older stagehands who were actually

laying down bets that she would screw up the cues during the two performances! Happy to say, the shows went on without a hitch and she actually got some begrudging kudos from the guys afterwards.

Chris spent 14 years living in Manhattan on the Upper West Side and working first as an editorial assistant at a tax publishing company, working her way up to Editorial Services Manager by the time she left the company. Then her work took her to the legal world and she spent nearly 20 years working at two of the largest law firms in New York. She finished her working life as a personal assistant to a partner at a private equity firm four years ago.

Along the way, she moved back to New Jersey, landing first in North Brunswick and then in Rahway. Her retirement plan was to move to Rossmoor where some dear friends from childhood already lived (and to make new friends like Lorraine Haucke who introduced Chris to WCCP) and spend her leisure time seeing Broadway shows, reading, doing embroidery and most of all travelling. The global situation from March 2020 until this year put a pause to that, but as things are clearing up around the world, she hopes to get her suitcase packed again with a trip to Scotland planned for this spring, then maybe Italy to visit friends and perhaps a repeat visit to Australia.
