Raising Awareness of African American Artists

Speaker: Joyce Felsenfeld

Joyce Felsenfeld, a docent at the Princeton University Art Museum, will give an art talk on Monday, February 17, titled "Raising Awareness of African American Artists". The talk is especially pertinent during February, which is Black History Month.

The talk will feature artists from the 18th to the 21st century, including an artist who was once a slave.

Black artists faced significant barriers to attain acceptance into art schools in the US until the 1960's when segregation was ruled unconstitutional. There will be a variety of artists, styles, and themes in the artwork that will be shown and discussed.
